COVID-19 Vaccine

If you have been having questions about whether the Covid-19 vaccines are safe and effective, please take a look at this information: <u>Mayo Clinic - Covi-19 Vaccine myths</u> <u>debunked</u>. I will be getting my vaccine as soon as it is available to me and encourage you all to do so as well. Getting vaccinated is our way out of this pandemic.

At this time, schools are not designated as vaccine administration sites. I will keep you posted on vaccine availability and clinics as I become aware of them.

Important Immunization Update

During the current COVID-19 situation, the U.S. CDC and Maine Immunization Program are recommending that children continue to receive their routine vaccinations. To prevent the spread of vaccine-preventable disease, it is important now more than ever to keep our immunization rates high. Please note the following important immunization requirements dates:

All students entering grade 12 are required to provide documentation of the following immunizations by the first day of school.

•Two doses of meningococcal vaccine (MCV₄) with a minimum interval of 8 weeks between dose one and dose two. If the first dose of meningococcal vaccine was administered on or after the 16th birthday, a second dose is not required.

Starting September 2021, Immunization Exemptions will only be accepted for a Medical reason the first day of school. Documentation must be provided ANNUALLY by a licensed health care provider (doctor, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant). Please contact your child's health care provider to discuss this further. There is plenty of time to get your child fully vaccinated prior to the required date.

Immunization records can be faxed to school at 236-7813.

Sight for Students Program

Does your child need an eye exam or new glasses? Please contact me to see if you qualify for the VSP Global® for Sight for Students®, an Eyes of Hope® gift certificate program providing gift certificates for a no-cost eye exam and, if prescribed, new glasses that NASN members can distribute to students 19 or younger, who qualify.

For a child to qualify for the program:

- Family income is at or under 200% of federal poverty guidelines.
- Child is 19 years old or younger and has not graduated from high school.
- Does not have any vision insurance (including Medicaid or other government programs that cover routine eye exams).

Camden Hills Athletics From "The Hart"

CHRHS Winter Season Update (12/22/20)

Here is the latest information on high school sports at Camden Hills for this winter. I want to thank everyone for their patience, as developing all of this has been challenging at best for everyone involved. It's been amazing with this pandemic how things change so quickly. We all need to understand that this is all just a sign of the times for this year, with the hope that 2021 will bring us all some welcome relief from all the Covid challenges.

It's important to know that everything we are doing is falling within the guidance provided to us by the Maine CDC and the Department of Education, and is subject to change at any time.

Sports that have been labeled "lower risk" are **Alpine Skiing, Nordic Ski**, and **Swimming**. We are currently working on schedules for the ski teams. By rule, they are allowed to travel to anywhere in the state to compete (unless that county has been designated as yellow or red). The Swimming schedule is also being worked on, although it looks like their meets will all be virtual.

Sports that have been labeled as "moderate risk" are **Basketball** and **Ice Hockey**. These sports are allowed to travel to compete against schools that are in our county (Knox), or an adjacent county (Lincoln and Waldo). Basketball will have a schedule that will involve teams from those three counties. We are in the position with Ice Hockey where we are not allowed to compete against any other teams because there are no other hockey schools within those three counties. Therefore, hockey will have practices and play intra-squad games only. The guidance regarding these activities has changed since the Fall, hence our ability to compete regionally. **Face masks are to be worn at all times by all teams, and there are absolutely NO spectators allowed for ALL of the sports. It will be our goal to live stream as many of these events as we can.**

Wrestling is labeled as a "higher risk" activity and therefore is not allowed to compete until later in the winter. Right now, the date for that has been set for February 22nd as the first day of practices. We will hopefully have more information about that as the winter rolls along.

The starting date for winter teams to begin practicing is January 4th. However, coaches were allowed to have some individual skill and conditioning work starting December 21st. Please check in with the head coach of a program to get more information about signing up and being involved in a sport.

Congratulations to the Visual and Performing Arts Department's Student of the Month for December:

Isaíah Doble

It is a pleasure to recognize Isaiah Doble as the December Student of the Month. Not only in the month of December (when countless virtual choir recordings were being finalized), but in every month, and every year leading up to the present – Isaiah Doble has been active in the performing arts ensembles at CHRHS and within the surrounding community.



A member of Chamber Singers and Chorale, Isaiah is a leader within the ensemble (receiving the Outstanding Chamber Singer Award in 2018) and a participant in many auditioned choirs. Each year of his high school tenure, Isaiah has been selected to participate in the Maine Music Educators District and All State Choirs. In his Junior year, he challenged himself by completing a rigorous audition for the All Eastern American Choral Directors' Association Honor Choirs, and was accepted into the Musical Theater Honor Choir. He had the distinction of performing in one of the last ACDAsponsored honor choirs before the shutdown in March of 2020!

On the stage of the Strom, Isaiah has performed many roles – both through the CHRHS performing arts program and through the community dance program: Kinetic Energy Alive. His recent roles on the stage of the Strom included Neleus/Featured Dancer, in *Mary Poppins*, Lord Evelyn Oakleigh in *Anything Goes!*, Zazu in the KEA dance production of *The Lion King* and Featured

Singer and Ensemble member in *In the Heights*. Of the roles Isaiah has played he notes: "I would say my two favorite roles in the Strom were definitely Lord Evelyn Oakleigh and Zazu. Both of these roles had very comedic and theatrical personalities, and I had a lot fun challenging myself to embody these very big characters (I equally enjoyed Major General Stanley from *Pirates of Penzance* in middle school for similar reasons)!"

Outside of the classroom, Isaiah seeks many arts performance outlets including six years of dancing with Kinetic Energy Alive; acceptance to AMDA's High School Summer Conservatory/Dance Theatre program, a highly selective program where Isaiah was one of approximately 20 dancers selected from an international applicant pool, and received instruction from Broadway performers/choreographers and AMDA faculty; and is currently serving as a State Thespian Officer for the Maine Educational Theater Association.

No matter his college career focus (whether it be music education, psychology or political policy) Isaiah is determined to keep the arts central to his life. He recommends that younger students remain involved in the arts programs and notes the following: "I have always found it easy to get lost in comparison and stress while rehearsing or performing. In these moments, I have to remind myself what is so wonderful about the arts: it can enable you to explore and express your individuality! If there is one thing that I have learned about the arts, it is that there is never one way to be a phenomenal and inspiring artist. Always remember that."

CHRHS Choruses present a "Virtual Concert"



It began as a community project – a way to share music with area nursing homes and assisted living centers. Each year in December, the CHRHS Choruses have sung for the community, whether at nursing homes or at the Camden Public Library or around the tree during Christmas by the Sea festivities. Yet December 2020 presented new challenges. Not only could we not do the traditional singing for the public, we also could not rehearse together indoors at school. Therefore, the choirs resorted to using technology as a way to create music for the community.

Through the fall and winter months, the ensembles still rehearsed. Yet rehearsals were either outside during temperate days, or inside listening to practice tracks. The students then took the practice tracks home and created their own tracks – singing into recording

devices. They had to find quiet places to record – sometimes their bedroom, or the family garage, and even sometimes in a car.

What to do with all of the tracks then landed in the capable hands of Ruben Feldman (21). Ruben used the software Ableton Live to mix all of the individual recordings into one virtual choir. Ruben created musical magic – and it is fitting that he plans to continue to study computer music and/or music engineering in college.

The 40 minute concert includes 7 virtual choir ensemble selections, 4 student solos, 1 winning song (from our songwriting challenge: Pavo the Pandemic Puppy) and some Zoom pictures. It is holiday oriented in theme – yet some people enjoy holiday music throughout the year! Thank you to our accompanist Matt Mainster and audio technician Ruben Feldman. We hope you enjoy the concert.
