From the Principal

This past week has been a sad week for our school community and for the larger community. I do not have any words of wisdom, but I do want to acknowledge how hard this is on many of the members of these communities. Watching the community's response has been heartwarming and a reminder of why I love to work here.

I want to share a little about Mid-Coast School of Technology. We currently have 81 students attending programming on the MCST campus and another 34 who participate in programming here at the high-school. Last year MCST moved their introductory programming here to the high school. MCST has provided a staff member to teach this programming and will continue to use our spaces as a satellite campus. In addition, we have a School to Career Coordinator provided by MCST who works out of building.

Our participation has increased significantly over the past four years for a variety of reasons. Our Guidance staff has emphasized the programming available to students. The completion of the new facility has also made this programming more attractive to students. In conjunction with the new space, MCST has added high interest programming such as Outdoor Leadership, Firefighting and EMT preparation. Additionally, MCST switched to an every other day schedule to match the surrounding schools. This change means students attend MCST for a full day and do not need to return to the high school for the second half of their day. The past schedule meant losing about an hour traveling back and forth each day for students attending MCST.

I have attached a short video introduction to MCST for those of you who would like a virtual tour.

On January 28, in response to the ongoing public health crisis of COVID-19, President Joe Biden signed an executive Order designed to “Strengthen Americans’ Access to Quality, Affordable Health Care.” Because of this order, the Department of Health and Human Services is expected to open HealthCare.gov for a Special Enrollment Period from February 15 to May 15, 2021. This Special Enrollment Period will give Americans who need health care coverage during this global pandemic the opportunity to sign up. Maine Immunization Law

Maine has a comprehensive Immunization Law requires that all children to be vaccinated against several diseases before they may attend school. This law was amended and beginning on September 1, 2021 only Medical Exemptions will be allowed. Students with medical exemptions must submit a letter from their health care provider (doctor, nurse practitioner or physician’s assistant) each year for your child to attend school.

The superintendent is not permitted by board policy to allow students to attend school who are not adequately immunized or do not have a medical exemption on file by the first day of school.

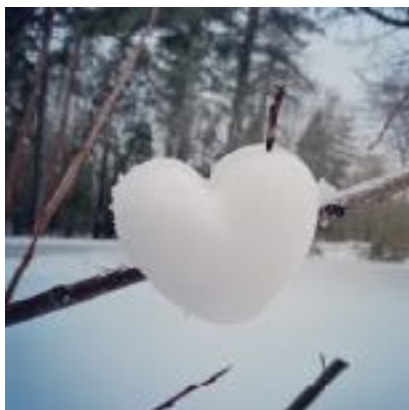

Perspective on The Pandemic Year - Tolerance & Adaptability

When asked how we in the transitions skills program have fared during this pandemic school year, in all honesty, given the circumstances, the answer is "quite well." While in-person learning is best, we have also experienced some pleasant surprises as we have adapted to our new normal.

I must mention our successes are not singular; I happen to work with an exceptional team of paraprofessionals. Each of them brings their own unique perspective, varied talents and skills, allowing TLS to meet the needs of our students, and allowing them to flourish. Of course, we could not be successful without the support of administration and the flexibility and acceptance of the dedicated teachers here at CHRHS. Those involved in our success include grounds crew, custodial staff, office support staff and food service personnel; all have helped us along the journey, in a special way. I am proud to say that in this challenging time, I work in a truly supportive and accepting environment.

Our adaptation to remote - hybrid learning has been aided by our previous online school-based experiences. Online speech language services, as well as the push to use online formats helped us prepare for last spring's intensive online experience as well as this year's learning model. In addition, we have appropriate program staffing ratios allowing us to coordinate, adapt, accommodate and modify learning for each of our students in the program.

The keys to this pandemic experience for TLS have been tolerance and adaptability. If what we are doing does not work, we try another approach until we find what works. We find that to help students prepare for life beyond these walls, we have to have a combination of established routines (the known), while still pushing the boundaries of learning (the unknown).

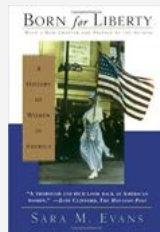

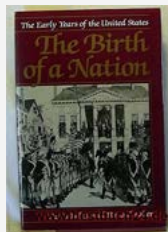

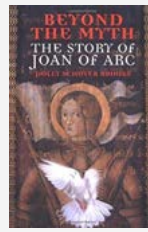

CAN WE KEEP ALL THE BOOKS, FOREVER?

Nope, not in the ESVM Library! In our library, shelf space in our physical collection is finite and, in a typical year, we order approximately 500-600 new books. We follow district policy for removing and disposing any books from our shelves, and are also guided by the principles of the American Library Association for curating a fair and balanced collection. This is an art more than a science, and there are many acronyms that librarians use when we consider removing a book, such as FRESH from the New York City Public School Library System.

Though the numbers of circulation are listed above, this is not the only metric that's useful for weeding decisions. Physical appearance is an important criteria for a high school collection (but be assured, *everyone* judges books by their covers). Does it look old or cheesy? Is it obviously graphic design straight out of the 1990s? Is it falling apart or damaged? We also consider information accuracy and relevance to our community, such as genres, formats, and interest areas, as well as curricular ties to classes

and units of instruction. Context of the collection is also important. How many books do we have in a particular section of nonfiction, for example? If it's a book that represents a certain viewpoint, do we have other books that present an opposing view? Do we have fiction books that include a diverse representation of authors, protagonists, and experiences?

A good library collection is dynamic, adapting over time to best serve our community. This means continuous weeding - just like in any garden - to create space for the gems of our collection to shine.

Belated Happy Birthday

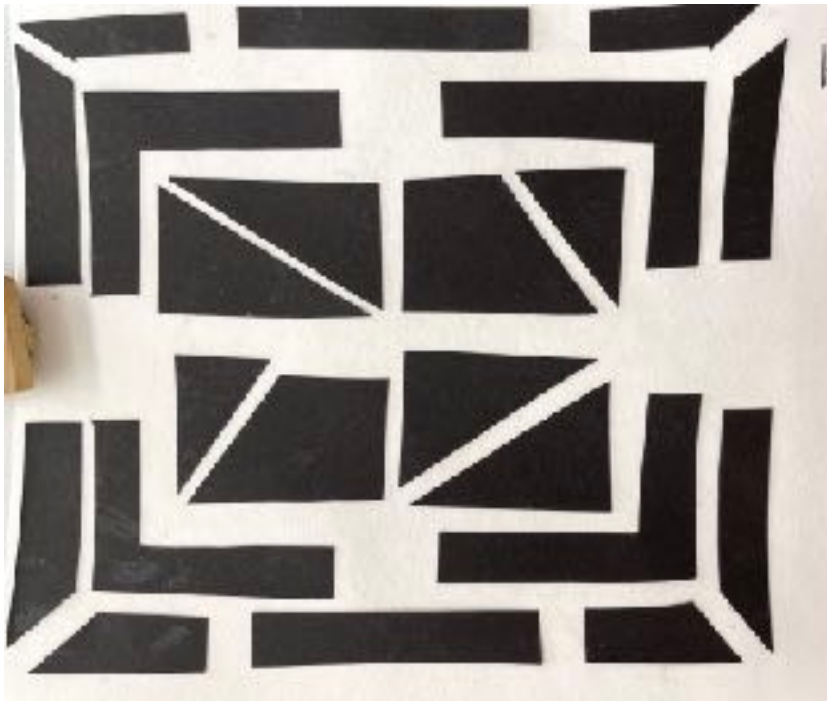
