

From there, the students paper mache, added details and finished off their Big Heads with paint!








This year, because of Covid restrictions, the visual arts teachers took a different look at what a Gifted & Talented workshop could be. Each teacher lead a workshop, allowing for a multi-medium experience for each student. The final workshop was Mold Making, which took place over a span of 2 weeks as an 'in-house' field trip during school hours.

The group was introduced to two different forms of 1 part waste-mold processes; students were able to get first hand knowledge of mold making at a rapid pace.

With a focus on 1 subject -the student's body -individuals had the opportunity to make a dunk mold with a non toxic alginate material as well as a 1 part plaster gauze mold. Each type of mold making allowed for 1 plaster pull.

There were great successes and great failures to be had!

## New Course this year: Honors Reading for Pleasure, Jamie Gillette

One of the newer senior English electives is the semester-long "Reading for Pleasure," designed to rekindle the love affair with reading that many students had in late elementary and middle school years but often become disconnected from as their reading habits change in high school. Students pick their own books, either from the library's rich collection or from their own homes or libraries, based on generalized unit expectations and create a variety of artifacts documenting their engagement with reading. Units include genre exploration, adaptations, and living author study, and students joyfully rediscover the pleasure of locating their own titles and authors to enjoy. The course has been generously supported by the ESVM librarians, Mrs. Eichenlaub and Mrs. Chamberlin, who are generous both with their book recommendations and reserving the library for students on book-choosing days.

Students taking the course for honors-level credit complete additional projects, including writing blogs to share their experience with books and recommendations for specific titles with a larger audience. 
## My Experience With Reading by Bella Gallace

As a busy high school student, like I know most of you are, I have struggled with finding time to read books that I am interested in. Most of my reading has been of books that were required for classes. I constantly feel as though I don't have enough time for reading outside of school or that other things are more important

than reading for fun. However, I have learned that finding the right books to read can have a drastic impact on how I view reading. Recently I have rediscovered my love for reading that I had when I was growing up. For a while I wasn't even sure what types of books interested me because I read so rarely but after discovering books that I did enjoy I found many genres that interested me such as thrillers, memoirs, and historical fiction. ## Review of Ishmael by Jonathan McDevitt

Ishamel is a book that is truly like no other. After seeing a strange advertisement in the paper ("Teacher seeks pupil. Must have an earnest desire to save the world. Apply in person."), the narrator is led to a most unusual teacher. Together, these two explore life, society, and humanity's place in the world in a philosophical discussion that we read about through the narrator's thoughts.

This book offers perspectives that I never would have thought about before on just about every page. It takes on several seemingly unanswerable and unusual questions, such as "What is the right way to live?" and "How did things come to be this way?". Then, using only some reflection on history and thought, it considers them in a very logical way and comes up with a clear answer for all of them.

This book is incredibly valuable due to what it has to say. With countless environmental problems arising nowadays and constant debates over them happening regularly, new perspectives on the ways to fix these problems are very rare and quite useful, since they could possibly bring up better ways to do this.

I'd recommend this book to everyone. While this book is interesting, the importance of what it has to say is why I make this recommendation. It provides an incredibly thoughtful viewpoint on what humanity has done since it first appeared, and whether you agree with the book's perspective or not, you'll most certainly be reflecting on our way of life by the end of it. I should also mention that *Ishmael* is a part of the Humans and the Environment English class offered at CHRHS. This is why I read this book— I never would have known about it without this course. So, if you're interested in reading this book for a class for whatever reason(discussing it, analyzing it, etc), then you may want to consider taking this course in your senior year.

It's been an interesting and challenging year in so many ways, and that was true out on the track this spring as well. We began our season with masks and distancing and a schedule with very limited competition. And yet, as we have seen from our CHRHS students all year, the track and field athletes rose to the challenges presented to them. It's been a pleasure to be out on the track everyday with athletes who were having fun, working hard, making new connections, and setting and achieving some pretty impressive goals.

And out of these efforts emerged a great story: Allison Gill, a junior, became the 3rd generation in her family to set and hold the record in the discus at her high school. Her grandfather, Paul Gill Sr, still holds his high school record of 168'5' as well as the outdoor discus record at Notre Dame set in 1970 with a distance of 191' 7.75" Allison's father, Paul Gill Jr also holds his high school's record with a distance of 158'8."

The loss of the track season last spring was a disappointment to Allison, but it did not stop her and her father from getting out in the circle and practicing technique. In what would prove to be the only (unofficial) track competition last spring, Allie and her father held a 2-person meet and went head to head in the discus with Paul Sr acting as the official. Of the results of that contest, Paul Jr said, "I think I edged her out by a few measly feet. That might be the last time I can beat her!"

Allison set the school record on the first meet of the year and subsequently broke it two more times. We look forward to seeing her and all of the qualifying track and field athletes in action at the state meet this weekend.

## IMPORTANT INFO FOR COLLEGE BOUND STUDENTS

Did you take the SAT or Accuplacer? Have you taken a placement exam to determine your fall course assignments in English and Math? Or has the college placed you into classes that may be referred to as "developmental"? Adult Education provides summer assistance to students placed in Developmental Level coursework. Working with us over the summer can save you time and money.

What is a Developmental Level course? Generally, any Math or English class that begins with the number "0" such as 065, 070, 030,

050. These courses prepare you for the rigors of college level course work, but they do not count toward your required graduation credits and they do not transfer to other colleges and universities. However, they DO cost the same per credit rate. With Adult Education, we can prepare you to enter directly into 100-level courses in the fall at no cost.

If your scores are within the ranges below, you are likely required to take college coursework that will not count toward graduation requirements. You qualify for free services with Adult Education.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT DEVELOPMENTAL COURSES

Developmental courses prepare students for the rigors of college level course work;

Developmental courses must be taken if a student places into them; \*

Developmental courses cost the same per credit as college-level courses and qualify for financial aid; Developmental courses do not transfer to other colleges and universitites and they do not count toward graduation requirements.

#### DRIVER'S EDUCATION

Classes begin every month with Roy's Driver and Rider Education. Instruction is done remotely and at home, CDC guidelines are followed for all driving instruction. Final exams are held at Camden Hills Regional High School.
