## **Transitional Life Skills November News**


This fall our focus has been on getting outside to enjoy our beautiful midcoast area before the cold weather sets in. Although, that being said, there is no bad weather, only poor choices in clothing, so we aim to get outside year long...





For our first adventure, we visited Coastal Maine Botanical Gardens! Our class had a plant propagation lesson, a Five Senses Garden Experience Tour and a hike to see the giant troll sculptures hidden around the beautiful gardens. The following week we went on an ocean adventure with Captain Alley on F/V Tornado Alley. Captain Alley gave

us a a boat tour of the Whitehead Lighthouse and Two Bush Lighthouse, as well as a lobster trap haul demonstration.



Next, we picked apples at Hope Orchards; we learned about different varieties of apples, and took our bounty back to class to make apple tarts and apple sauce. The TLS crew also joined Rising Tide for an apple cider press demonstration and cider samples (Thank you RT!). Last week, we hiked Fernald's Neck Preserve and had a picnic by Balance Rock.





Most recently, this October, we joined the 2021 Life Happens Outside Challenge through the DOE. "The Teens to Trails" goal is to challenge Maine middle and high schools to foster an appreciation for

the outdoors and its multitude of wellness benefits. This weeklong challenge took place Saturday, October 23 through Friday, October 29 and was designed to get students active and connected to the outdoors. The sponsor, Arcadia, provided a \$1,000 prize to the three Maine middle and high schools with the highest amount of outdoor time proportional to their school size (at time of publishing the winners were TBD). We hiked/logged the PBMC Wellness Trail, Bald Rock Mountain Multiuse Trail (from the Lincolnville side), and the Georges Highland Path to Round The Mountain Trail and on campus hiking during this challenge. In November we will hike the Jones Brook Area Trail beginning in the Thomaston Town Forest. All trails we have accessed, so far, have been within 25 minutes of school and do not take more than 1.5 hours to hike. To acclimate our bodies for all of this hiking, we have been accessing our very own Crockett Trail as much as possible. We will plan on as many excursions as our academic schedule allows to build our stamina and our appreciation for what Maine has to offer.

A big thanks goes out to our Wave Cafe crew, who keep us well fed with brown bag lunches on the longer field trips! We are very fortunate to live here in Coastal Maine (where the



mountains meet the sea!). Enjoy your Thanksgiving break everyone & get outside if you are able!







# Students Transform "Waste" to Resources at The Hatchery Workshop

The *Radical Reuse* movement has been steadily extending beyond the bounds of The Hatchery Workshop, like mycelium. Look around, and you may see traces of its presence growing in the land-scape.

As you drive around campus, notice the emergence of outdoor wooden furniture in the courtyard by the Science and Humanities wings. This ring of handmade seating elements, known as "The Learning Circle," represents the effort of students in The Hatchery's Shop Apprenticeship Program. Inspect the end grain of any component—as we have during class—and count the growth rings. Each ring denotes a year in the tree's life. If you do this, you'll discover that the lumber which makes up this beautiful furniture collection came from trees *two*- to *three*-times as old as the students who made it.

Think about this: had we not intercepted it, all this perfectly workable lumber—much of which began its existence as seedlings in the 1970s and early '80s—was destined for the landfill due to minor "imperfections." Rather than accept this regrettable standard, students gained skills, created functional objects, and acquired a newfound awareness of their environment from this undervalued stockpile. In short, they transformed so-called "waste" to knowledge, resources, community assets.

On Saturday, October 23rd, The Hatchery hosted its first event on *Radical Reuse*, celebrating the achievements of these young Apprentices/Ecopreneurs, and further interrogated the issue of "waste" management in our community and culture at large. In the afternoon, students showcased their newly acquired skills by running furniture-building and screen-printing workshops, even selling furniture and T-shirts they produced themselves to friends, relatives, teachers, and community members. In the evening, our event shifted to a guest lecture panel. Two CHRHS parents, **Shawn Stockman** (Green Stewards Alliance, Founder) and **Tia Anderson** (Midcoast Habitat, Director) shared their professional expertise: unpacking the good, the bad, and the ugly of material flows on a local and global scale. The evening ended with a remote presentation from **Sara Badiali** (Reclamation Administration, Founder), a very special guest from Portland, Oregon, who was instrumental in passing the first ordinance of its kind in the world: mandating deconstruction, rather than demolition, for any homes built before 1940 within city limits.

What does this mean? Rather than demolish these buildings—crushing them mercilessly with an excavator, spraying them continuously with a fire hose to minimally manage hazardous dust emissions, scooping all the mixed-up debris into a series of dumpsters, and sending it to the landfill—Portland pioneered a bold alternative: requiring its older buildings be carefully dismantled, often by hand, saving sometimes upwards of 90% of building materials from heading to the landfill. These materials then get brought to salvage stores (like the *Habitat ReStore* in Rockport), and are re-sold and -purposed by a variety of professionals: artists, craftspeople, designers, furniture-makers, builders, and even homeowners. Since this unprecedented ordinance proved so successful in Portland, Oregon, Badiali has assisted other cities throughout the country—Denver, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, etc.—to begin making a transition from demolition to deconstruction practices, as well.

If Portland, Oregon can do it, why not Midcoast cities? Or better yet: if Portland, Oregon can do it, why not Portland, *Maine*?

As a response to this enlightening event, The

Hatchery has been even more committed to practicing *Radical Reuse* throughout its many fall and winter projects.

Next time you venture over to the Bus Barn, look around back at the start of a new garden. Collaborating with Zenith, The Hatchery facilitated a raised-bed build exclusively using salvaged lumber—some of which was sourced from deconstructed pallets—and helped preserve the beds by using on old Japanese technique, *shou sugi ban*.

With that same supply of pallet lumber, The Hatchery's Shop Apprentices have been building an attractive new shelving system for the student food pantry at *Camden Thrift*. In a similar spirit, Ms. Brown's BIG ART students have been assembling kinetic sculptures at The Hatchery Work-

shop over the past month, imaginatively incorporating found objects and sundry scraps.

And, most recently, Principal Carlson asked The Hatchery to creatively redesign and repurpose the old booths from the cafeteria that have been sitting within the colonnade by the front entrance since the beginning of the school-year. Get ready for an exciting example of student-designed and -built adaptive reuse in the coming weeks!

We implore you all join us in the *Reuse Revolution*. It's only just begun!
