Navigating the Storm

I want to proudly share how the CHRHS Community Fund has innovated during Covid to meet our students' and families' unique needs. 3 students experiencing homelessness were buoyed by our community, from housing and food to clothing and comfort. CHRHS provided over 130 holiday meals for CHRHS families and a reprieve from that worry. Over 140 holiday gifts found new homes, including winter clothing, socks, and gift cards. A dozen families received fuel assistance. 5 students gained greater independence with driver's education assistance. Our complimentary gift table, equipped with a wrapping station, allowed over 50 gifts to be given proudly to loved ones during the holidays.

While the holidays gave us renewed purpose, the community's support of CHRHS is evidenced every day of the school year. Through the community's value in education, all students receive two free meals daily, continuous access to fruit and milk, free pantry food to take home, personal hygiene items at no cost, free trendy clothing from our new Chills Thrift (including new socks and undergarments), and mental health services from our two lovely social workers.

I hope this message reminds our school community that while we are collectively all dealing with Covid, the struggles experienced by some are not experienced by all. I hope those who have thrown a life raft realize their impact on our community. Whether you donated gifts, food, or financial resources, you helped students feel seen and valued. You helped families face the storm surges of Covid, and you helped a school community show that if we face this storm together, we will come through it.

I am grateful -- grateful for the 48 donors (CHRHS staff, parents, and friends in our community), the CFC organizers, the worker-bee shoppers, the Camden Area Christian Food Pantry donations, the dedication of the Community Fund Advisory to our school, the compassionate outreach of Katie Cronin, the organizational prowess of Shaunna Brown, and the countless people working diligently behind the scenes.

As we start 2022, I am grateful for the compassion, kindness, and generosity of our community,

In Big Art class one group of students is building a portable installation structure for the automata they made earlier in the semester, after everyone collaborated on a mock-up design in class. Students used both traditional and digital drawing tools to sketch the mockup construction, and add their own ideas. The building group is learning specialized construction methods, including working with simple framing and stair construction. It's going to be amazing!



There's great stuff happening in Photo/Mixed Media!

As the daylight diminishes, and the world takes on a monochromatic appearance, students looked at that as an opportunity for new observations. The theme of "Black and White Maine" began with looking at and analyzing black and white photos, including works by local photographers Neal Parent, Kosti Ruohomaa, and Patrisha McLean.

Students shot digital photos that worked well in terms of value, shape and texture, rather than color. Mixing up media approaches, we looked at how Rockport printmaker Carrol Thayer Berry used inspiration from his photos to design his

woodcut prints, and students created their own monochromatic prints in relief (carved) or silkscreen. For reference, there's an excellent collection of historic photos by Ruohomaa and Thayer Berry on the Penobscot Marine Museum's website, https://penobscotmarinemuseum.org/



local artist. Maggie B. made a silkscreen from her drawing, and printed on t-shirts and paper; she's adding color and


