## Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching Maine's 2021 Finalist

#### **CONGRATULATIONS** Lora Levenseler!

The Presidential Awards for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST) are the highest honors bestowed by the United States government specifically for K-12 science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and/or computer science teaching. The Awards were established by Congress in 1983. The President may recognize up to 108 exemplary teachers each year.



Awards are given to science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and/or computer science teachers from each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Department of Defense Education Activity schools, or the U.S. territories as a group (American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and U.S. Virgin Islands).

The award recognizes those teachers who have both deep content knowledge of the subjects they teach and the ability to motivate and enable students to be successful in those areas. Since the program's inception, more than 5,200 teachers have been recognized for their contributions in the classroom and to their profession.

Awardees reflect the expertise and dedication of the nation's teaching corps and they demonstrate the positive impact of excellent teachers

on student achievement. The National Science Foundation administers PAEMST on behalf of The White House Office of Science and Technology Policy.

Nominated teachers present evidence of their teaching skills, including videos of their classrooms, curricula and assessment documents, and a personal evaluation and reflection of their practice. Based on a thorough review of that evidence, up to three state-level finalists are forwarded to a national selection committee composed of K–12 teachers, administrators, university professors, and STEM education researchers. That committee reviews the evidence again to select one national-level awardee for each state.

Lora is currently one of the Maine state-level finalists for this award; national awardees have not yet been announced. **Congratulations, Lora!** 

#### **CHRHS Windplanners Visit the Maine Statehouse**



On April 13th, 13 Windplanner students, our schools sustainability team, headed to Augusta to meet with legislators and network with students from schools across the state on current legislation that is important to a sustainable future. One of the group's priorities was to be able to voice the importance of taking immediate action to reduce the burden their generation will carry for climate change impacts. It was also a chance to connect with Wabanaki youth leaders who are actively working to advance some critically important issues of tribal sovereignty and access to clean water.

The day started with a press conference where we heard from youth across the state

talking about bills in active legislation of importance to them. These bills included supporting climate education in schools across the state, supporting lower energy costs through upgrades to the energy grid so renewables can flow more easily and several other bills.

Next, students ventured into the statehouse to talk to our representatives about these bills. They observed the legislature in action and thanks, to Representative Vickie Doudera, they were acknowledged with a standing ovation from all the legislators. They mingled in the "lobby" with other people representing interests and called legislators out to talk. It was an experiential opportunity to participate in the way our democratic system works.

Students spoke to Senator Dave Miramant and former candidate for Governor, Betsy Sweet, about a variety of topics, including information about how laws really happen in the statehouse. Students were given some key tips on how to approach and talk with legislators.

A meeting with Representative Bill Pluecker allowed us to talk about several environmental issues including the current work to understand and remedy the PFAS pollution that has troubled many farms. He helped arrange a meeting with Governor Janet Mills. We were joined at that meeting by many of our local representatives, Rep. Doudera, Rep. Pluecker, Rep. Ann Matlack, and Rep. Stanely Zeigler. Governor Mills didn't accept questions but was eager to share innovations happening in the energy sector and key projects that she feels are key to the health of Maine's economy and climate.

The Windplanners team returned excited to have been involved with democracy in action and knowing they can be a part of the direction Maine goes in the future.

Windplanners have many projects underway that are all focused on helping CHRHS move to a greater place of sustainability.



#### **CHRHS Presents A Spring Choral Concert**

The Camden Hills Regional HS Chorale, Chamber Singers and Treble Choir will present their Spring Choral Concert on Tuesday, May 17th at 7:00 PM in the Strom Auditorium.

The ensembles, directed by Kimberly Murphy and accompanied by Matthew Mainster, will perform a variety of selections, featuring many soloists and guest artists. Of special note will be Bangor Symphony Orchestra percussionist Nancy Rowe accompanying the Treble Choir on xylophone in their performance of Mark Patterson's "Edges of the Night" - a song that highlights the plight of refugees. Ms. Rowe will also play the djembe to accompany two selections by the Chorale and Chamber Singers. A guest string quartet: Sarah Glenn (violin), Heidi Karod (violin), Linda Vaillancourt (viola) and April Reed-Cox (cello) will accompany the Chamber Singers' performance of "Deep Peace" written by Elaine Hagenberg and Ola Gjeilo's "The Ground." Both selections incorporate the theme of peace, with Ola Gjeilo's composition ending with the lyrics "Dona Nobis Pacem" (grant us peace).

Additional themes concurrent in many of the selections are that of youth and hope through music. Young singers in grades 3 – 8 will join the high school Chorale in a stirring rendition of "Rise Up" – a song made popular by Andra Day. The performance will feature many soloists including Sara Ackley, Alyssa Lewis, Lenigha White, Noelle Delano and young singers Rowan McWilliams and Nathan Gomez. The string quartet will return to accompany the Treble Choir in a selection which highlights the beauty and hope of music in "Always Something Sings." With text by Ralph Waldo Emerson and music by Dan Forrest, this selection also highlights guest singer, Lydia Day. The theme of hope for our youth continues with the Kyle Pederson composition of "Remember the Children." Kim showed students how to use her custombuilt Plastic Upcycler to grind up #2 plastic, then heat and extrude it into shapes to use for sculptural work. The plastic can be reused indefinitely. The classes collaborated on a mural for the bus loop stairwell, and for now it's installed in a window on the top floor. 




#### Diverse Perspectives Book Club



Even though it has been a cold, wet season, spring is springing! We have had a few issues with heat in the greenhouse but students have been hard at work and plants will be ready for the sale.



We will have lots of vegetable and herb seedlings, as well as, a variety of annuals and perennials. New this year will be a selection of house plants grown and donated by the horticulture program at the Maine state prison. In addition to plants we have bags of compost for sale. Each bag is about 40lbs of high quality, organic compost and will sell for \$6 each.

The sale takes place Saturday, May 14 from 8am –1 pm and on Sunday, May 15 from 9am to 12 noon at the greenhouse on campus.
