Reflecting on CHRHS Equity Initiatives

For many of us, the fall and winter holidays are a time of joy and celebration. For some students and families, however, the holidays can be a stressful time, both financially and emotionally. We are proud of the services offered to our students to help alleviate the stress of the holidays and to support learning every day. Food insecurity is tackled through free breakfast and lunch for all students, along with continuous access to milk and fruits while at school. Our wraparound services include a fully stocked food pantry, an after-school snack pantry, and holiday meal services. During the holidays, we provided meals for 132 kids and their families. We also provided over 250 gifts to students, including warm winter essentials and more. Funding for our equity initiatives is provided by CHRHS staff (holiday gifts), community donations (gifts and monetary contributions), local support (Camden Area Food Pantry, Seacoast Security), and no overhead costs. Due to the volunteer efforts of our Community Fund Advisory Committee, 100% of the donations went directly to serving the needs of our students. Thank you to the committee members: Shaunna Brown, Katie Cronin, Megan Bendson, Carolyn Brown, Kristen Campbell, Mary Wells, Kim Nicolet, CFC members, Worker Bees, and all of our "holiday elves."

Speaking, Listening, Reading, Writing: 2023-24 Upper Grade English options

Rising Grade 11 and 12 students have many options to fulfill English graduation requirements, mostly one-semester courses offered at both college prep and honors levels. (Additional independent projects and more rigorous standards required for honors credit.) A preview:

AP SEMINAR (yearlong Grade 10/11)	Engage in a college-level seminar featuring collaborative and creative inquiry-based analysis of relevant issues.
AP LANGUAGE (yearlong Grade 11/12)	Engage in a college-level seminar featuring rhetorical analysis of non-fiction texts, including speeches, letters, essays, and political texts.
AP LITERATURE (yearlong Grade 11/12)	Engage in a college-level seminar featuring literary analysis of imaginary (fiction) literature, including poetry, theater, short stories, and novels.
AMERICAN EXPERIENCE	Follow American trials and triumphs with a focus on race, economics, gender, and identity.
Chinese Studies	Connect classic and modern Chinese literature to foundational elements of Chinese culture and society.
Creative Writing	Hone your writer's craft through a writing workshop model to create original prose and poetry writing with compelling language.
Debate & Mock Trial	Research controversial issues in preparation of oral sparring using a variety of structured debate protocols.
HUMANS & THE ENVIRONMENT	Explore how humans' dominance on the landscape has affected present-day environmental challenges and consider solutions to the problems.
Indigenous Voices	Celebrate voices of Native peoples (esp. Wabanaki of Maine) by studying indigenous authors, films, and indigenous ways of knowing and being.
Journalism	Uncover media bias, analyze techniques of contemporary journalism, and pursue your own topics of interest in a portfolio of articles.
OH MY! SCI-FI!	Examine the speculative worlds of post-apocalyptic/dystopian science fiction where authors glimpse into humanity's future.
OUTDOOR LIT	Read stories of real and imaginary survival and adventure, and deepen your exploration of the world outside our doors.
Philosophy (Part 1/Part 2)	Question the very reality humans experience through deep questions and rich discussions about readings probing the nature of thought.
Poetry	Discover how poets compress meaning through special tools and create your own written or spoken word poems.
RACE & IDENTITY	Center marginalized voices and embrace challenging conversations about race, gender, and identity.
READING FOR PLEASURE	Reawaken your love of reading while exploring writer's techniques in entirely self-selected titles within a variety of thematic units.
WARRIOR TALES	Trace the evolution of "warriors" over time, from ancient heroes to modern soldiers, and their effects on society.
Women & Literature	Investigate the female experience through texts written by women authors emphasizing women's struggle for identity and self-awareness.
Writing for College (Eligible for 3 UMaine credits)	Gain skills and confidence by writing a variety of products, including narrative essays, college application essays, and a major research paper.
















Art Club Carolyn Brown, Advisor
