






#### Drawing 2 Carolyn Brown, Teacher






Advanced Drawing & Painting Carolyn Brown, Teacher



Being selected for this festival is an incredible honor. We are so proud of our students who pursue their passions with dedication and excellence.











# Annual CHRHS Ski Team Ski Sale A GREAT event that supports affordable outdoor fun!

Winter is coming and signs are pointing to a snowy one. The best way to enjoy winter is to get outside! Do you have the equipment you need to enjoy the outdoors this winter? Have your kids outgrown their winter gear? Do you have gear that is no longer working for you or your family?

The best deal in town to buy or sell your winter gear is the annual Camden Hills Regional High School Ski Team Ski Sale, which takes place November 17th - 19th. There will be a wide selection of new and used equipment at great prices. The sale includes skis (both nordic and alpine), boots, poles, snowboards, skates, helmets, skates, winter clothing and more.

To consign your older, but still usable gear, pre-register online to save time <a href="https://tinyurl.com/register-items">https://tinyurl.com/register-items</a>. Items must be brought to the high school on **November 17 between 3:30** and **8:00pm** to be tagged and included in the sale. **PLEASE NOTE**: On this Friday - the <a href="entrance to register items">entrance to register items</a> is at the back of the school through the athletic door by the mini gym. (Unfortunately we don't have space to store items ahead of time.) During the consignment process you will set the price of your items. Unless you choose to donate your items, the high school ski team keeps 25% and you get 75%. You may set a



lower price for Sundays on any items that do not sell on Saturday. On Sunday between noon and 1:00 pm, pick up a check for the items that were sold and take home any items that didn't sell. You can watch the status of sales online by going to the website. If your items don't sell they must be picked up by 1:00pm on Sunday or they will become the property of the CHRHS ski teams.

The sale happens at Camden Hills Regional High School on Saturday, November 18th from 9am to 1pm and Sunday, November 19th from 10am to 1:00pm in part of the cafe and minigym (new location for this year).

**SideCountry Sports** will be selling a wide selection of new and used gear at great prices. Selection is better on Saturday but there are bargains on Sunday. Sunday prices will be available on the website after 5 pm Saturday.


