



CHRHS Garden News

The school garden had a very productive season and many hands involved made this year one of the most successful years yet.

We had several students work for pay or volunteer their time. The students had support from adult supervisors, Erica Anza and Margo Murphy, to coordinate planting, weeding and harvesting. Additionally, many garden projects were completed. These included a new raised bed that was built and installed with the help of the Hatchery summer



interns, rebuilding stairs and the patio area, installing new fencing around the garden and orchard. To install the fencing, we had help from a wonderful group of community members that helped the summer gardeners. Students from Rising Tide finished it up this Fall.



Funds to purchase fencing came from Maine Agriculture in the Classroom grant, a statewide organization that supports school gardens, and proceeds from the annual plant sale. It was clear that fencing was key to keeping out the deer, groundhogs and other critters that wanted what had been planted.

We will continue to harvest until a freeze ends the growing season. Rising Tide students will help put the garden to bed and plant garlic for next year. That will allow for some rest for all that helped this year until the next growing season.

SUSTAINABILITY: WE'RE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER CONTINUED


The new push to electrify heating, especially in areas previously relying on heating fuels like fuel oil and propane, has allowed many households in our community to reduce or eliminate dependence on fossil fuels. While the power from Maine's grid comes from many different sources, electrifying heating, especially in a cold climate like ours, provides an easy pathway to then making sure the power comes from renewal sources, maybe even solar panels established at the home site or through a solar farm collective. Governor Mills announced in July that Maine had met its goal to install 100,000 new heat pumps, and hoped to install another 175,000 by 2027. As reported by Bloomberg, roughly 20% of new homes in Maine have heat pumps, an installation rate more than three times the national average.

Staff and students are excited about their heat pumps! Spanish teacher Amy Ferlauto (pictured above) is enthusiastic about her upcoming plans to install heat pumps at home. "I want to lessen my fossil fuel impact...it's important that I do what I can to save the planet!" She will be applying for special loans designed to facilitate the purchase of residential heat pumps.

Science teacher Margo Murphy helps students understand how heat pumps work and why they are being heavily promoted within the state in both Grade 9 Global Science and AP Environmental Science. "From my polling of freshmen, most don't know how their houses are heated beyond that they have a thermostat. Families looking to install a heat pump need to understand all the ways a house consumes energy. Heat pumps are my primary way to heat (and cool) my house (with an oil furnace as a back-up source), and when I first had them installed my electricity bill went up, but I also went from buying 1200 gallons of fuel oil a year to maybe 200 now. You have to look at both sides of spending." Check out efficiencymaine.com for information about current rebates or incentives.

Let's not waste this holiday season!

Approximately 2.3 million pounds of wrapping paper finds its way to landfills each holiday season. This year we will also be offering reusable fabric gift wraps that can be reused at every gift giving occasion.
