From the Principal

These past few days have gifted us with sunny skies, mild temps, and bug-free spectator opportunities. Such beautiful moments, characteristic of an early Maine spring, are fleeting. As a lifelong educator, these days signal the closing of another school year. While it's easy to get caught up in the hustle and bustle of end-of-year events, I hope we all find moments to pause and enjoy the path our teens are carving out while at Camden Hills.

The path of teenagers through high school is filled with messy yet inspirational and often zigzagging growth. As I reflect on the busy months ahead, memories of my own parenting journey resurface, particularly my eldest's final year at CHRHS. From the earliest days of joining the Parent Club, I realized that parenthood was marked by emotional contradictions — feeling proud and anxious, frustrated yet brimming with joy, exhausted yet unwilling to miss a single moment of this remarkable experience. One year ago, I vividly remember experiencing a mix of nervousness and excitement as my child prepared for the milestone of graduation. In those moments, I mourned the conclusion of one life stage and joyfully celebrated the unfolding of what lay ahead. Watching and marveling at the evolution of a teenager's life, both as a parent and an educator, is a journey I have found to be filled with contrasting and beautiful emotions.

As a parent and the principal, I greatly appreciate our staff for contributing to our teenagers' paths to graduation. It's Staff Appreciation this week, where we celebrate and honor those who have dedicated themselves to nurturing the growth of our adolescents. I am proud of how our staff champions student engagement and individual growth. There's a unique satisfaction in watching a student's transformation from a restless and wide-eyed freshman to a somewhat more assured yet still maturing sophomore to a junior pondering life after high school, and finally, to a more confident and self-aware senior viewing the world as their oyster.

While each young person's journey through adolescence is unique, there are overarching patterns that unify the experiences of our Jammers. Just four short years ago, our seniors started their education with masks, hybrid learning, and the most unconventional start to high school in the history of Camden Hills. Yet, here they are, prototypically displaying the senioritis our 12th-grade teachers could diagnose a mile away. The universal elements of a student's four years at CHRHS reveal feelings of comfort and indicators of readiness, which brightens the hearts of all educators who get the privilege of being part of these defining moments in the lives of our students.

SUSTAINABILITY: WE'RE ALL IN THIS TOGETHER PART 6

All that warm April sunshine starts many of us thinking about gardening. Stubby leaves of rhubarb unfurling in the dooryard, bell-like flowers on blueberry plants, frothy white blooms on apple trees, or frilled true leaves of squash vines — all announce another year of nature's sustaining generosity.

A bonus of Midcoast Maine is the access to ample space to plant, whether in a backyard, a local community garden, or on the school campus. We all eat. Food that has travelled a shorter distance between where it is grown and where it is consumed is fresher and reduces carbon emissions. It also tastes great, especially when the trip to harvest involves a calming walk outside to witness bees endlessly pollinating blooms, to survey for potato beetles, or to thin out baby carrots.

Many CHRHS teachers are avid gardeners, eagerly paging through the Fedco seed catalog and awaiting the opportunity to break fresh ground. Gardening & Horticulture students (pictured above) spend the early weeks of February planting tiny seeds into moistened potting soil, and witness the greenhouse trays go from black to green with new growth. Some seedlings are destined for the school gardens to be incorporated into food served in the cafeteria, while most will be available for purchase during the school plant sale open to the public Saturday, May 18 (8-1) or Sunday, May 19 from (9-12) by the greenhouse.

Whether you are new to gardening or an old pro, consider the pleasures of soil under your fingertips. Plant a seed, care for it as it grows, and reap the rewards of your efforts out there in the sun.



GERMANY EXCHANGE

The CHRHS German Exchange group, led by Trevor Paul and Jane Chamberlain, completed their exchange experience with a wonderfully successful trip to Amberg, Germany over April break! After hosting 16 German students from Gregor-Mendel Gymnasium in September, it was our turn to travel, stay with families, and experience Bavarian history and culture.



Some of the highlights were a visit to Nuremberg Castle with a guided tour of the Nuremberg dungeons; a trip to historic Regensburg and the House of Bavarian History; a sobering tour of Flossenburg Concentration Camp; the unique experience of the "Kirwa" (regional folk festival); wonderful food, many classes attended, and much bonding with our



wonderful host students and their families, who offered us incredible hospitality and genuine affection. And this is not to mention the 2 days' "bonus" time in Munich...when our flight got cancelled! Although this did cause stress and many spent a chunk of time doing school work in hotel rooms, our fantastic group of students rallied and made the most of it.



The students learned so much, expanded their world views in so many ways, and made amazing and beautiful connections. Some have termed it one of the most amazing experiences they've had, and others are already seeking ways to return for a visits already this coming summer.

We hope to continue this great program with another group in a couple years!



Service Learning in the Dominican Republic

April break, nineteen students and three chaperones made their way to the Dominican Republic for a week of service learning and immersion in the culture and life of the Dominican people. We boarded a flight at midnight on Friday April 12th and landed in the arms of our fearless guide Adolfo Ramirez and our even more fearless bus driver Chichi Peña, (pictured here with Jacalyn Willams.) Early on Saturday morning we landed at our hotel in Santiago, slept for a bit, and then headed out into the city. Our first stop was the Centro Leon Santiago, an anthropological museum which set the stage for our immersion in the rich and diverse history and culture of the Dominican Republic. The tour carried us through a history of the island and expanded our understanding of how the nation was founded, its indigenous roots, and what shapes the Dominican Republic today.





The first exhibit we were led through had us "underwater" and allowed us to experience one of the diverse ecosystems that call the DR home. We traveled through time with our guide and left with a on which we could build a rich week long experience.

After lunch, we visited the Monument of Santiago (Monumento a los Héroes de la Restauración) This eight-story structure located in downtown Santiago was built by the former dictator Trujillo and later became a monument praising the soldiers who battled for Dominican Republic's independence from Spain. We climbed to the top of the

monument to look out over the city of Santiago. Students then had the afternoon to explore the city and visit the markets to shop for souvenirs while trying their best to haggle - a much encouraged strategy!

We spent the night in Santiago and woke up early the next morning to make our way to the north coast and the town of Cabarete, which would be our home base for the remainder of the week.

Along the way, we took a side trip to the 27 Waterfalls of Damajagua to jump and slide our way down seven of the waterfalls and enjoyed the thrill of navigating the river and the canyon it carves through the mountainside.



We all survived with the help of our guides Tony and Pepito!

We left the river to head to our home away from home for the next few days, Ali's Surf Camp in Cabarete, which is also Adolfo's home town. We settled in and headed to the beach for a swim and then had the first of many community dinners. This was our opportunity to come together, share our highlights, debrief and talk about the following day.

While at the DREAM Project, the students worked with a Montessori classroom and a group of 6-8 year olds as they finished a project on various body systems. Each day we spent the morning in the classroom working 1:1 with the children with the final goal of helping prepare them for a presentation they would be doing for other students in the school.

Learning: The DREAM Project

While some of our time was punctuated with fun activities, the primary goal of our trip was to partner with an organization to support the local community in Cabarete through The DREAM Project described below:

The DREAM Project is shaped by its mission and vision: "to provide high quality educational opportunities to children, youth and families in the Dominican Republic", and "Our transformative education programs complement the national education system and empower at-risk children and youth to create a better future for themselves and their families."

We started each afternoon with a community lunch with our DREAM Partners. After lunch, we were further immersed in aspects of the culture and history of the Dominican Republic: we attended a lecture about its history, learned how to dance the Bachata and Merengue, visited the Bachata Academy and Charlie (nearby DREAM-led programs which offer dance lessons, sports, and music classes), and participated in programming



led by *Deportes Para La Vida* (a program developed at DREAM which youth learn about the risks of sex, myths surrounding sexually transmitted infections (STI) and their transmission, and gender equity.)

Other Adventures!

In addition to our river adventure, we were also able to spend our afternoons snorkeling, going on a river boat cruise to Wilson's Beachside Restaurant and taking surf lessons.

Adapting and Responding

On Tuesday, Cabarete and its surrounding communities experienced a record rate of rainfall which resulted in severe flooding. Over two hundred families lost all of their possessions and schools across the region were closed. Adolfo met us at the surf camp to update us on the situation and then arrange for us to continue to serve the community by supporting a local community garden, Cabarete Sostenible. There, our students weeded gardens, collected wildflowers to dry for tea, and planted seedlings. At the end of the week, we met with Adolfo's sister Rosangel, who is working to provide relief to flood victims.

Our students donated clothing, toiletries, and money to her organization with the hopes of establishing a GoFundMe page to raise more funding to help out!



Guest Artist Workshop

Artist and entrepreneur **Hope Rovelto** was a guest artist in Ms. Brown's art classes in early May. Hope has an MFA in Ceramics, and runs her own silkscreen printing shop in Portland. She began the workshop talking about the path she's taken, from indifferent student in early years, to a successful artist and businessperson. She shared how she balances her interests in community

service, social justice, biking, and arts education, with the need to make a living-- a great topic for high schoolers to consider.

Before the workshop, we prepared designs to print on shirts and tote bags, and Hope brought the screens to print.

Every student had a chance to print a poster, bag or shirt with one of the designs.

Clay 2 class joined us for a period, and Hope demonstrated how to print with underglazes on clay, and how to make underglaze transfers to use on clay. This is an exciting option to combine printmaking and clay methods, that Ms. Brown uses in her personal clay work.

A future collaboration is in the works!

The Hatchery Ad Hoc Bike group also joined in, and printed a gorgeous student-made design on shirts for the group. Many thanks to the Bisbee Fund for supporting this amazing workshop.

Printmaking class worked with collagraph printmaking, using cardboard and other materials to make layered relief printing plates. Students learned how to use the printing press, with dampened paper and print blankets to create an embossed effect on the prints.

The class is working on stencil methods next, including silkscreen. Guest artist **Hope Rovelto** gave us a hands-on demonstration, and explanation, of silkscreen printmaking, and students are now designing their prints.

Drawing II finished a short unit on landscape and interior space drawing. We looked at artwork, and our actual environment, to analyze how we perceive depth, and how to create the illusion of depth on the 2-dimensional page. Drawings include techniques such as overlapping, diminishing scale, atmospheric perspective, and placement on the picture plane to show depth of space. After working with graphite pencils, we moved on to black ink and sumi-e brushes, learning how to use that media, inspired by Japanese and Chinese ink drawings.


