April 2024

Eclipse April 8, 2024

You have likely seen the stories in the news of an exciting event soon to happen. On Monday, April 8th, millions of Americans will witness a total solar eclipse! There won't be another total solar eclipse to cross North America from coast to coast until 2045 and not another one to cross Maine until 2079. The last one to cross Maine was in 1963.

We will experience a partial solar eclipse here in the Midcoast. Partial means it will be about 97% complete. Viewers may notice some darkening of the skies, but the sun will still remain bright. (about 1000x brighter than a full moon). Traveling to an area experiencing totality is well worth it! (See the map below for where to go.) You will need to travel at least 2 or more hrs to cross the line of totality. The zone of totality will be the only areas where you can observe the sun going black and observing the solar atmosphere. The event will begin around 2pm but totality won't take place until 3:15 or so, depending on where you are in the state. It will be imperative to keep track of time, travel, and weather conditions-keep fingers crossed for clear skies! Areas in the zone of totality are expecting many thousands of people, and single lane roads could increase traffic.



It is very important that you protect your eyes. Typically, when you look at the sun you squint, and your pupils constrict. During an eclipse those normal responses don't happen, and the likelihood of damage is greatly increased. The school and science department have glasses that are certified for safety. One hint is to make sure they are ISO certified and have the manufacturers actual address posted on the sides. CHRHS has been passing out glasses and will continue to do so until they run out.

Finally, many scientists will be collecting data related to weather, animal behavior and other phenomenon. If you are interested in being a part of data collection check out one of the projects NASA is hosting at <u>https://science.nasa.gov/eclipses/citizen-science/</u>. The University of Maine will be launching a weather balloon that will travel high above any clouds if there are any and they will live stream the event.

Health Office News A friendly reminder for all students in Grade 11:

The following vaccine requirement is for **all** students entering **grade 12** in order to attend on the first day of school year 2024-2025:

Two doses of meningococcal vaccine (**MCV4**) are required for students entering 12th grade, with a minimum interval of 8 weeks between dose one and dose two. If the first dose of meningococcal vaccine was administered on or after the 16th birthday, a second dose is not required.

Documentation of immunizations should be received prior to the first day of the 2024–25 school year.

Substance Use Trends Among Midcoast Middle & High Schoolers

Spring is here and everyone is looking forward to getting outdoors for spring sports. With baseball & softball, track & field, tennis, golf, and lacrosse season upon us, we want our students to be in their best condition possible. Alcohol and substance use, including cannabis, tobacco, and prescription medications are major concerns for Maine's youth.

Results from the 2023 Maine Integrated Youth Health Survey (MIYHS) show that alcohol use among middle schoolers, and marijuana and prescription drug use among middle- and high-schoolers, has notably increased in the Midcoast Public Health District since 2021. Below are some strategies to support our students to make good choices with health and wellness in mind.

Encourage Participation

Spending lots of time unsupervised after school and on weekends greatly increases the odds that teens will experiment with drugs, so being on a sports team is a protective factor. Make a special effort to involve youth in fun and rewarding extracurricular activities.

Keep Open Communication

Ensure that students know the risks of drug use, especially those that affect health and athletic performance in the shortterm and those that affect their future. Help them realize that most people their age DON'T use drugs. Encourage students to think about their future goals.



Set Expectations & Be an Example


Clearly express the expectation that students will not use drugs. Teens need expectations stated explicitly to understand the standards to which they are being held. It is also important that students are aware of the opinions held by influential adults in their lives.

Indigenous Voices Jane Chamberlain,Teacher

Students in Ms. Chamberlain's Indigenous Voices course wrapped up their 1st semester with a lot of amazing work and experiences under their belts. This class was a combination of 11th and 12th grades students who demonstrated fantastic engagement and were invested in creating a class culture full of curiosity, open-mindedness, community, empathy, and respect.



Following this work, students took a deep dive into US History through a different lens--tracing the Doctrine of Discovery from Columbus in the 1500s to The Marshall Court in the 1800s to court cases concerning

In November, students conducted timely research of Question 6, an item of legislation pertinent to the Wabanaki Tribes of



Maine, and presented their info to the entire student body in the auditorium during whole-school assembly, following by one of the most impressive circle discussions I've witnessed in 20 years of teaching.



Native rights reaching into the 2000s--and honing their critical thinking skills. They heard from many Indigenous voices through texts and award-winning documentary films such as Dawnland, and made connections in the material across other subject areas such as AP Environmental Science, Human Geography, and Outdoor Literature.



In mid-January we were honored to host local **Passamaquoddy drummer and singer, Francesca Bailey**, who spoke with us and performed for us (along with a 9th grade class) in The Hatchery Commons. There were many warm moments to be had in our varied Indigenous food experiences--from squash soup, to hominy, to roasted sweet potato and yuca, to sumac lemonade.



At the students' urging, and because of the value they saw in the interdisciplinary and placebased nature of the approach, this course has been approved to run for a full year next year, rather than just one semester, which will allow for more guest experiences, more project-based and exhibition work, and an added fiction unit. Several students from the course were

hoping to help Ms. Chamberlain present on the value of centering Indigenous perspectives at the annual MCELA conference in March.







Camden Hills Regional High School's Annual Plant Sale and Marketplace

The equinox has passed so spring is officially here even if it is teasing us a little. Plants are growing in the greenhouse at the high school and we are getting excited about the plant sale that will take place in May.



We have vegetable and herb seedlings, as well as a variety of annuals and perennial flowers. Plants are thriving this year and look wonderful. We have some new varieties and of course lots of the most popular varieties from the past. All plant containers are \$3 each and include single pots, 2-pks, 3-pks, and 4-pks. Buy 3 and get a 4th for free. On Sunday everything is buy one, get one free from 9-11 and the last hour everything is \$1.

In addition to plants it will be our last year of compost for sale. We have changed our composting system and are not producing as much. Each bag is about 40lbs, is

high quality, organic, PFAS-free compost and sells for \$10 each. This has been a very popular item so we are limiting it to 5 bags of compost per household.

We will continue with a marketplace that includes a series of *Radical Reuse* products students created in our school's design+build hub, the Hatchery Workshop as well as items created by our gardening and horticulture students. Items for sale may include outdoor furniture, planters, silkscreen T-shirts, and more – each made with reclaimed materials and careful handiwork. Support youth artistry, craftsmanship, and waste diversion all at once! Prices range from \$10 - \$200.

Sale takes place Saturday, May 18 from 8am – 1 pm and on Sunday, May 19 from 9am –



noon at the greenhouse in the rear of the campus. The sale always takes place the weekend after Mother's Day. To find the sale area go to the back of CHRHS near the loading dock area of the school and look for the greenhouse.

TITLE

Screens and Kids: defining the categories of device usage, understanding the impact on our kids, and ideas for managing your family's screen time.

DESCRIPTION

Parents and teachers in our community are seeing negative behaviors and outcomes that they attribute to kids' screen time. What are the impacts of screen time? Is all screen time the same? Grace will be providing an insider's perspective into the different types of device usage, how/why they are built in a certain way, and how that affects today's youth. While there is no single solution to the challenge, this presentation will cover frameworks for how to manage your family's decisions for device usage.
